Letter from Fire Chief Kelly

It is my honor and privilege to present to you the Olmsted Township Fire Department Annual Report for 2021.

The Olmsted Township Fire Department (OTFD) strives to provide our community with outstanding Emergency Medical, Fire and Rescue Services. The OTFD is a combination fire department *meaning we have both full-time and part-time firefighters*; we are staffed with 14 full-time members and are budgeted for up to 12 part-time members. We operate out of one fire station, which is located on Fitch Road, just north of Cook Road.

The OTFD operates with three (3) 24 hour shifts with an intended staffing level of four (4) or more firefighter/paramedics on-duty each shift, these are provided by two different funding/revenue sources; an Ambulance Fund (revenue received from insurance claims for billing of our emergency medical transports), a Fire Levy Fund (which consists of a continuous fire levy voted for by the residents in 2010) and an additional Operations Levy (passed in 2019 that will expire in 2024). *Our front-line engine and older medic unit are slated for replacement this year utilizing the new levy funding.* We humbly thank you for your support and will do our utmost to serve your needs and maintain your confidence!

In 2021, the Olmsted Township Fire Department responded to 2,197 emergency calls for service. Of those emergency incidents, 1,837 were emergency medical incidents, 290 were fire and/or rescue incidents and 70 were service-related incidents. The number of our simultaneous or overlapping calls (defined as two (2) or more calls in an hour) has increased to 621, which is over 28% of our calls. In 2012, we responded to 186 simultaneous calls. We maintain two advanced life support medic units, one frontline fire engine and one fire ladder truck in our fleet and other ancillary vehicles to support our mission. In addition, the OTFD inspected all our businesses and institutions and provided several community outreach/service interactions.

I would like to thank the Olmsted Township Trustees and the entire Leadership Team for their support, guidance, and confidence. Our Officers and Firefighters for their dedication and service. And our residents, and businesses for your continued support!

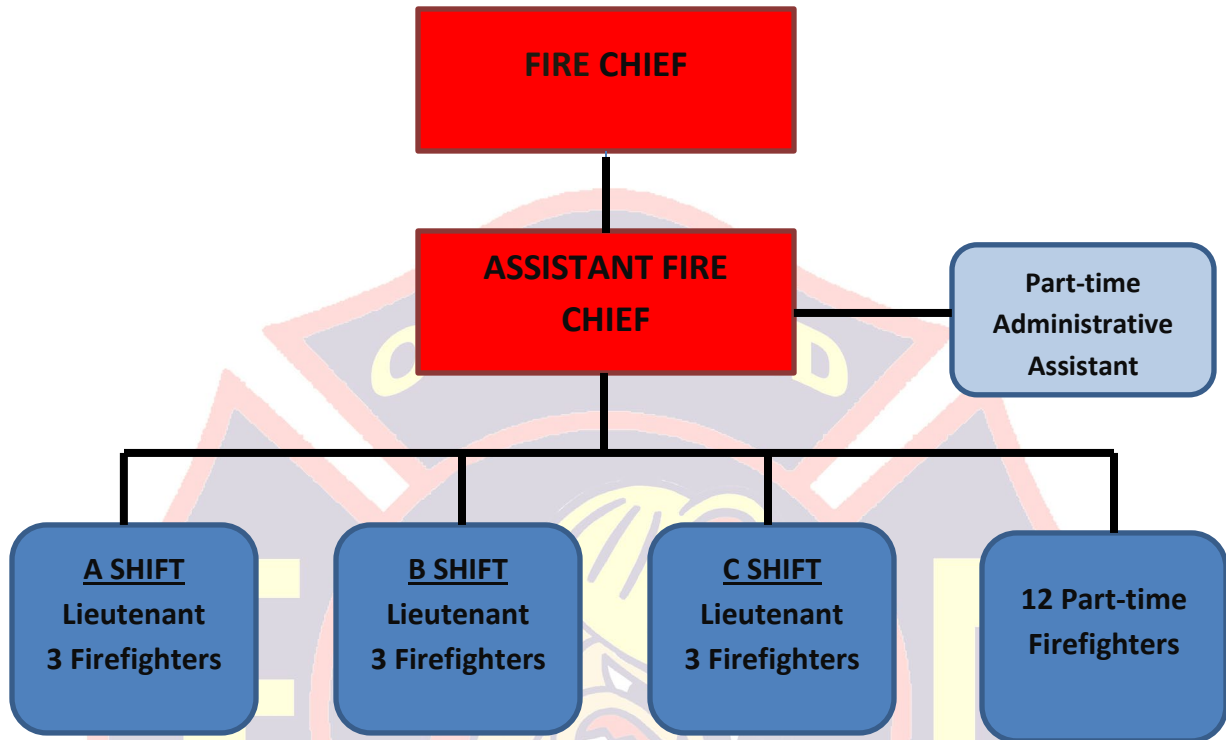

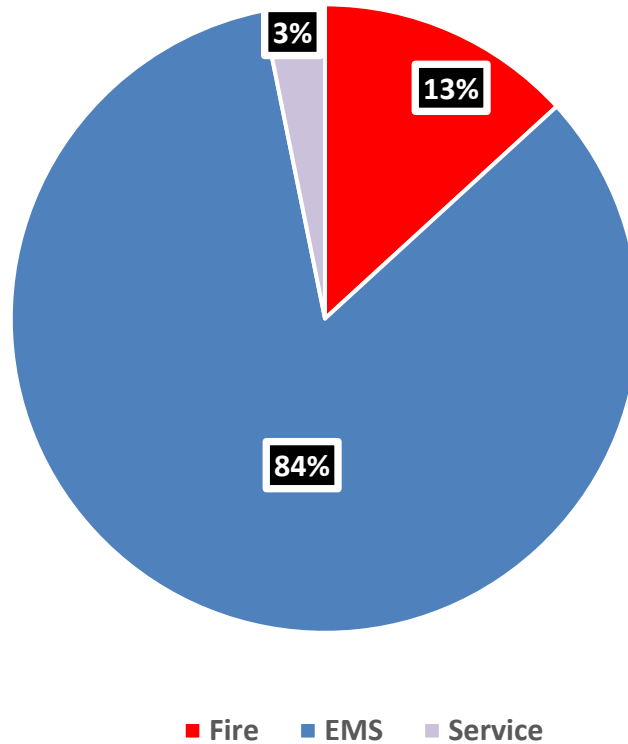

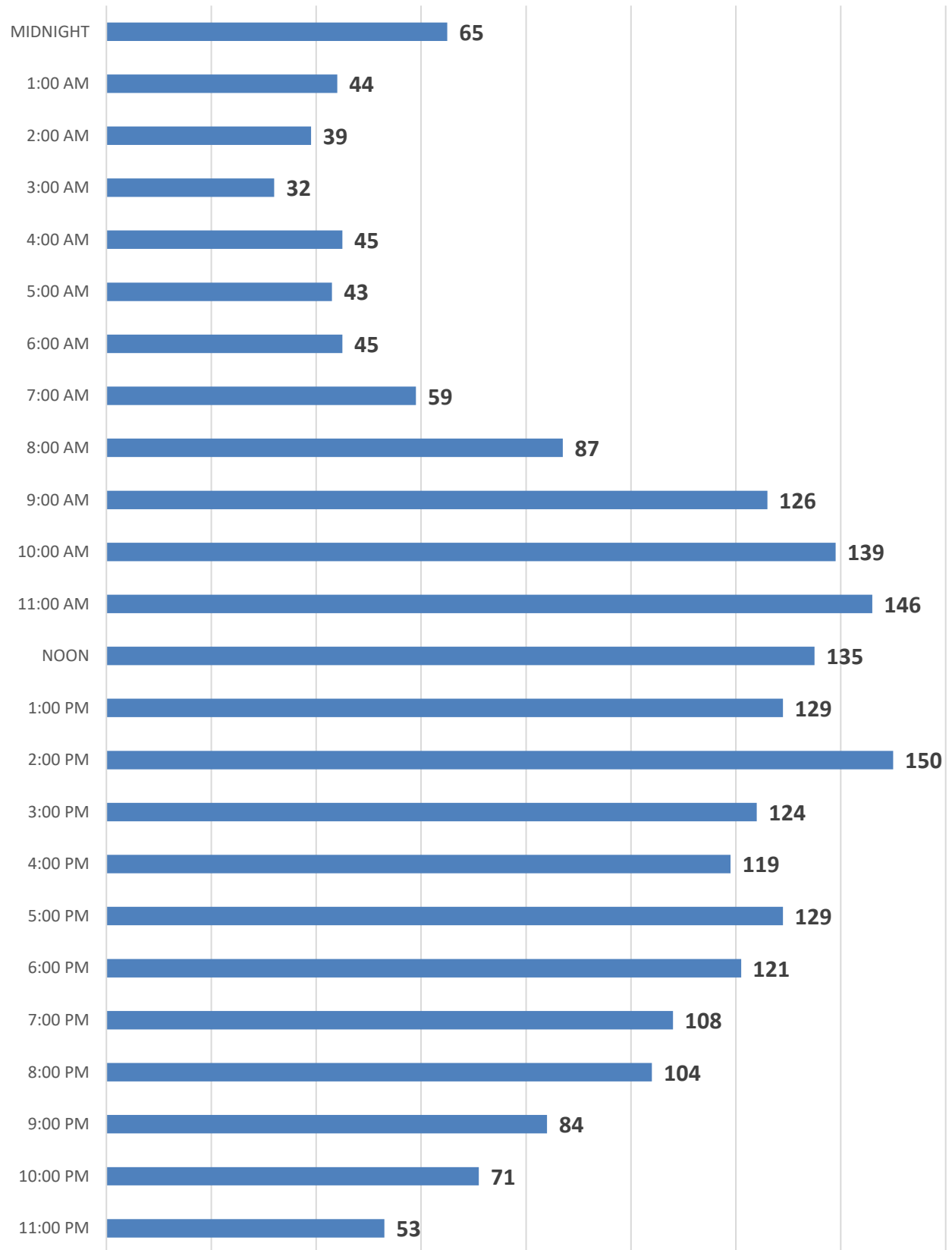

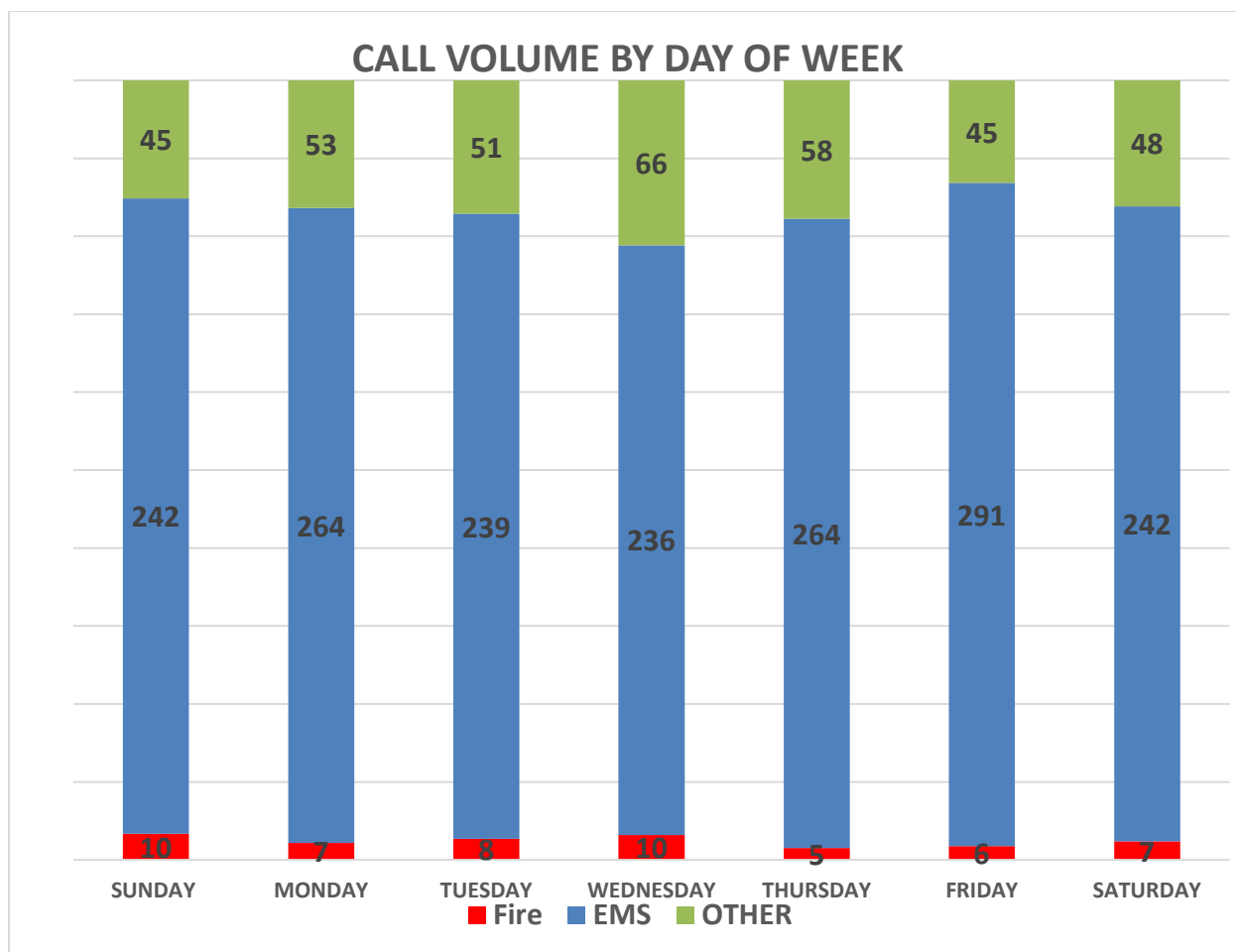

2021 OTFD Run Volume



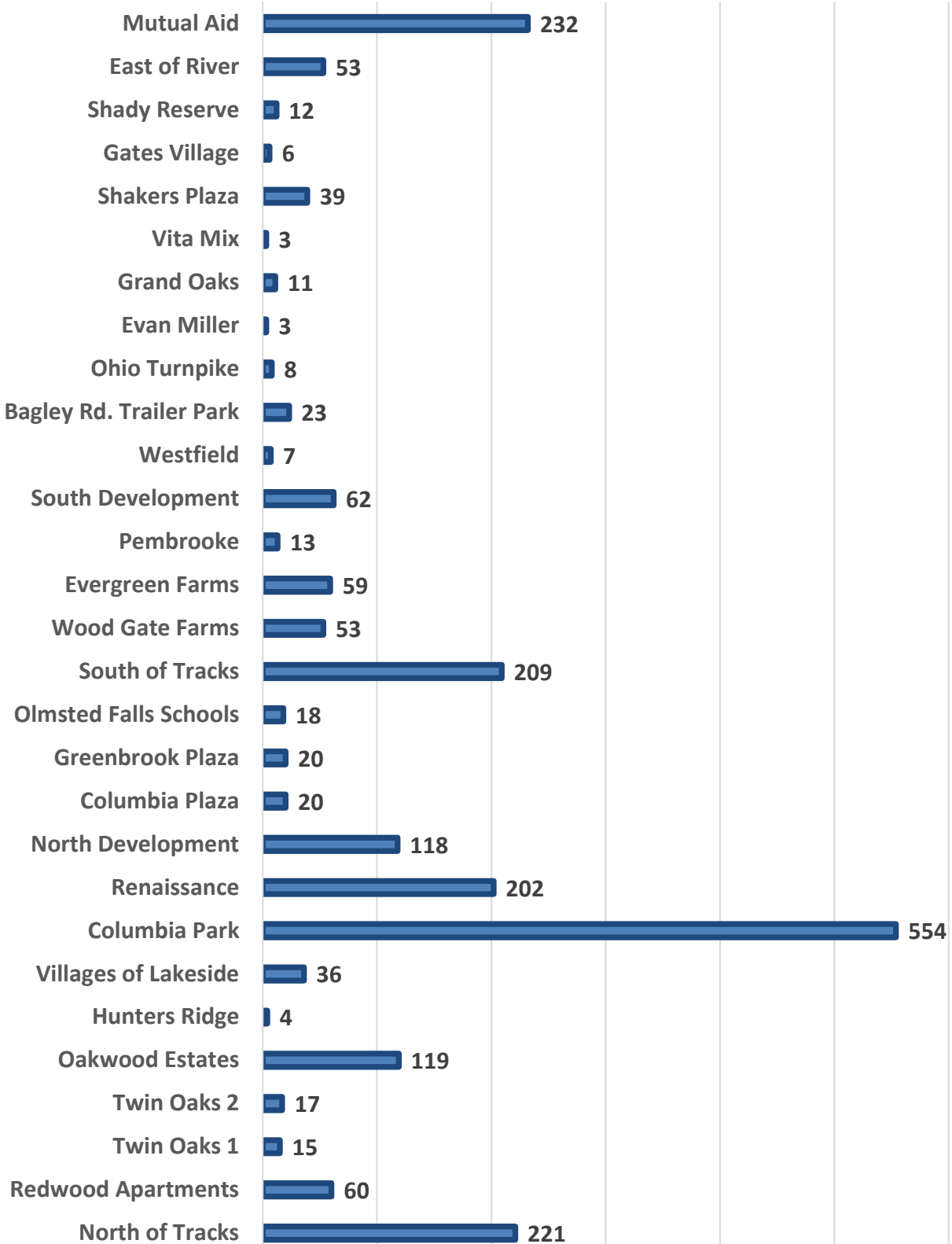
2021 CALLS BY TIME OF DAY

2021 Responses by Neighborhood



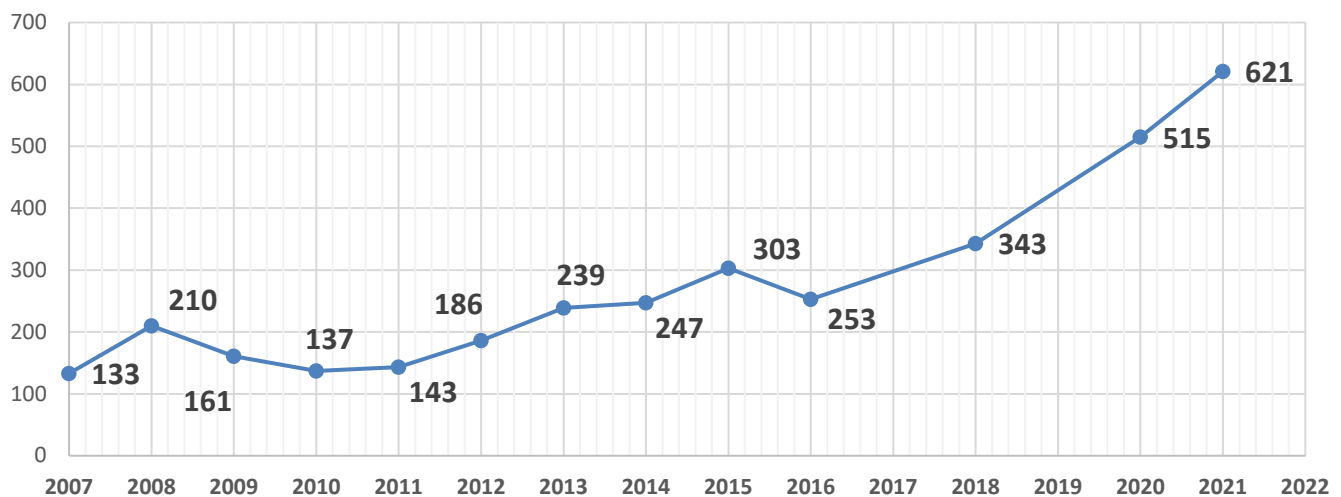
Simultaneous (Overlapping) Calls

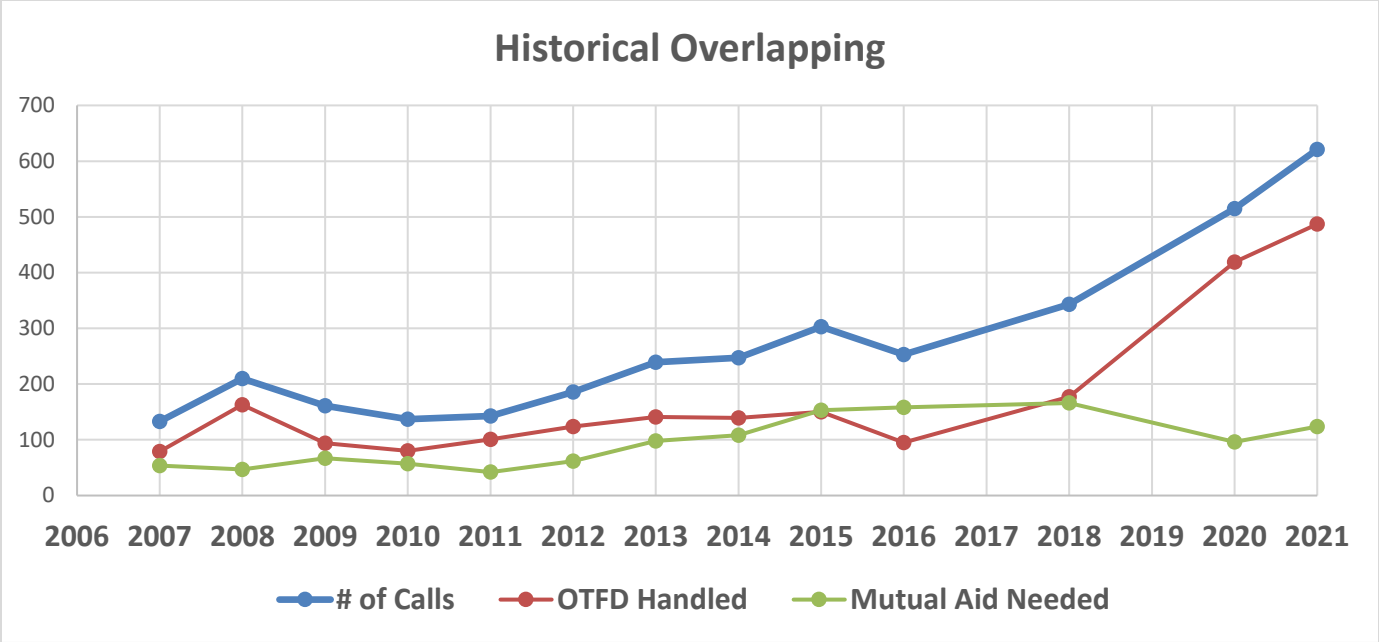

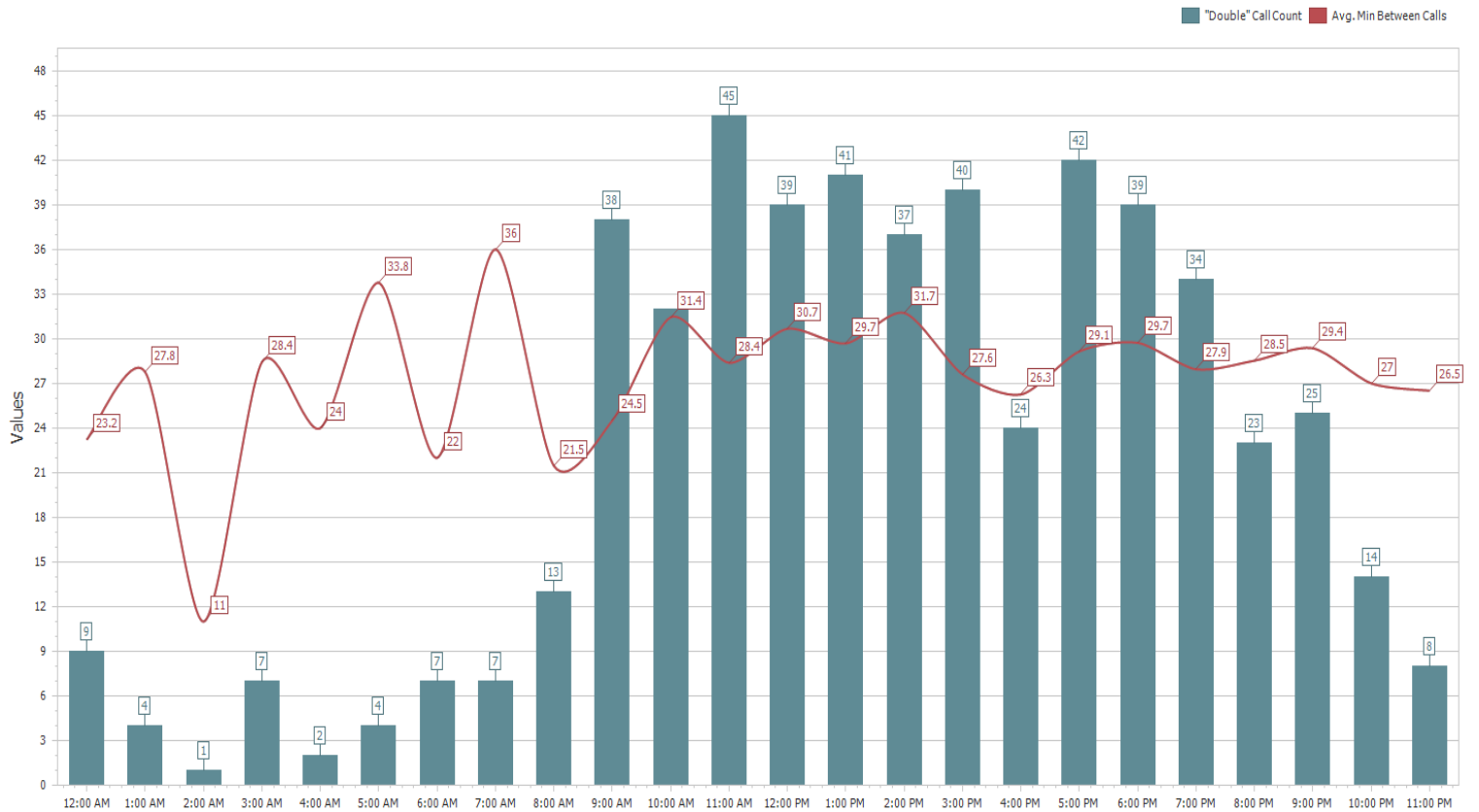

History of Overlapping calls





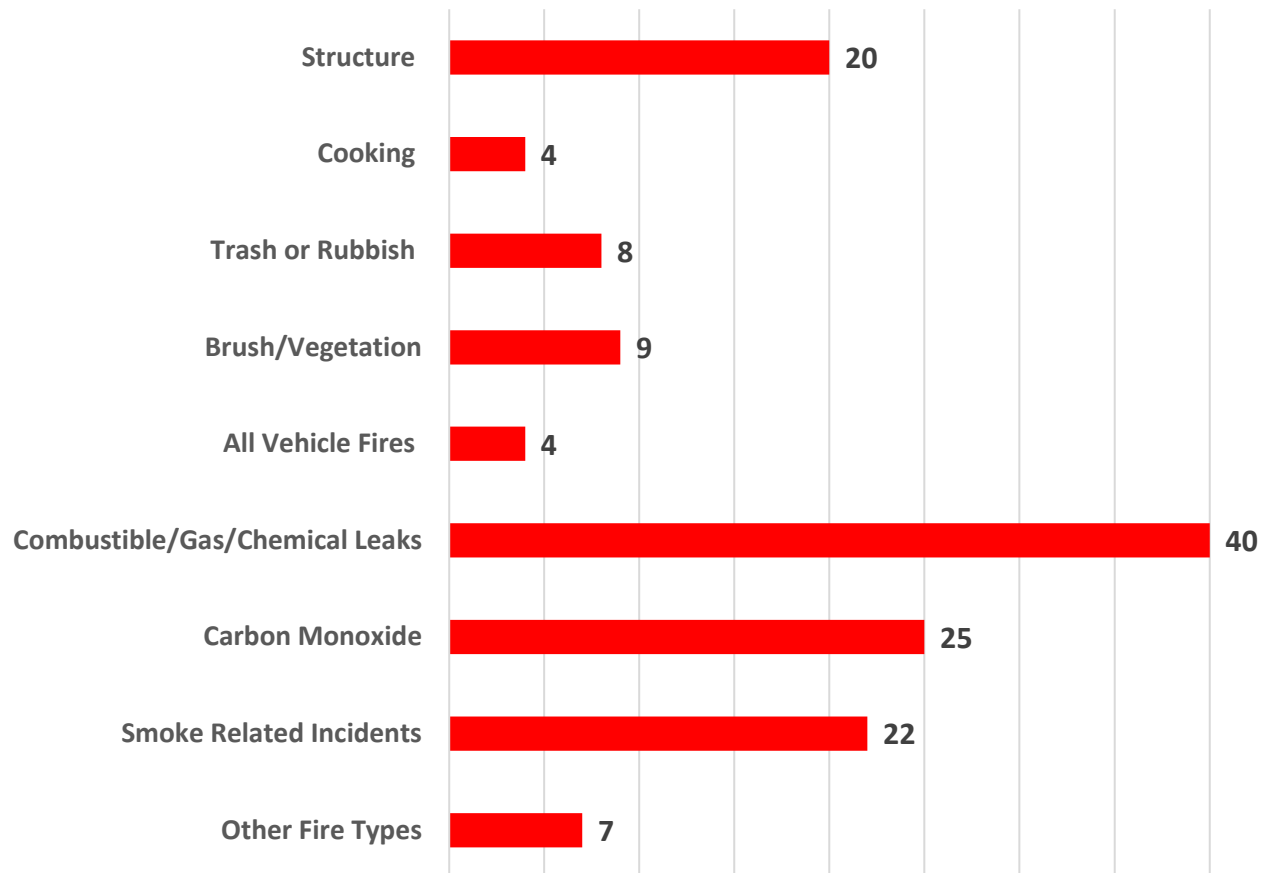
2021 Overlapping by Time of Day

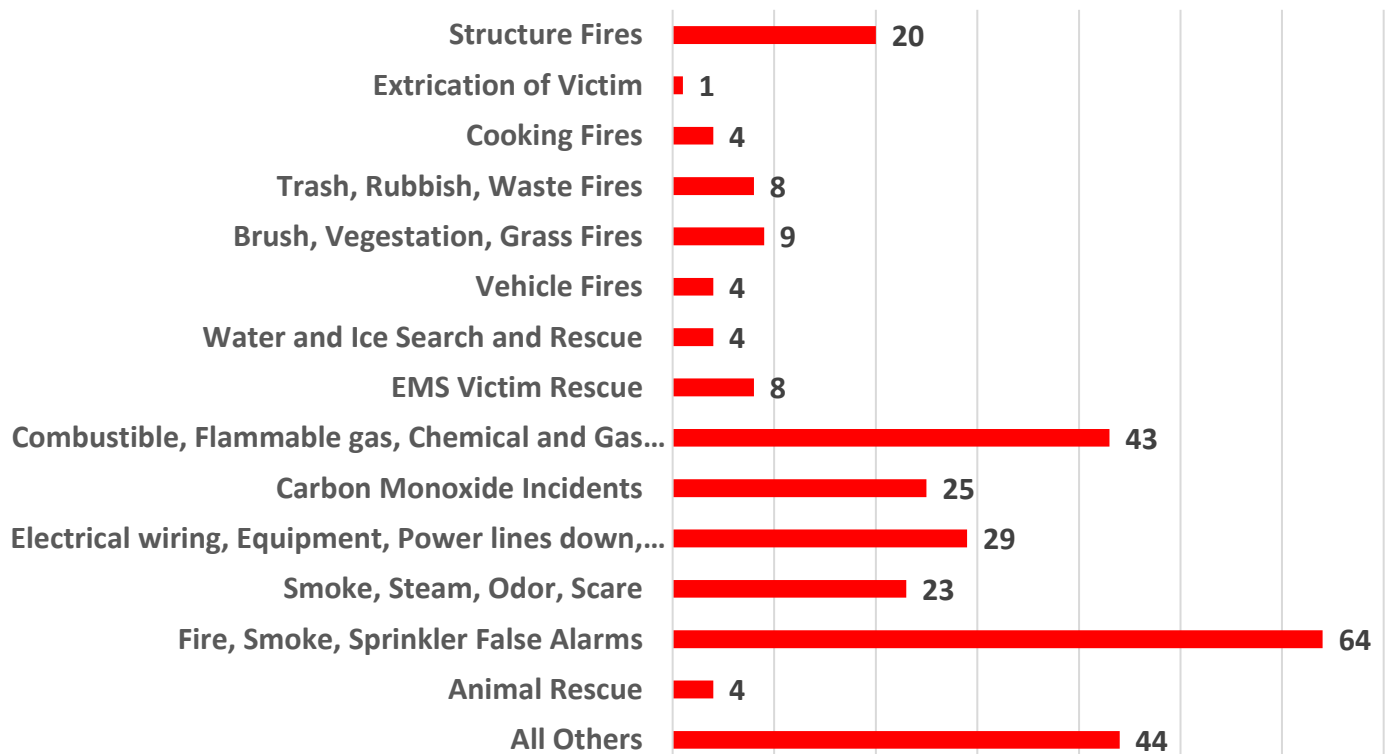

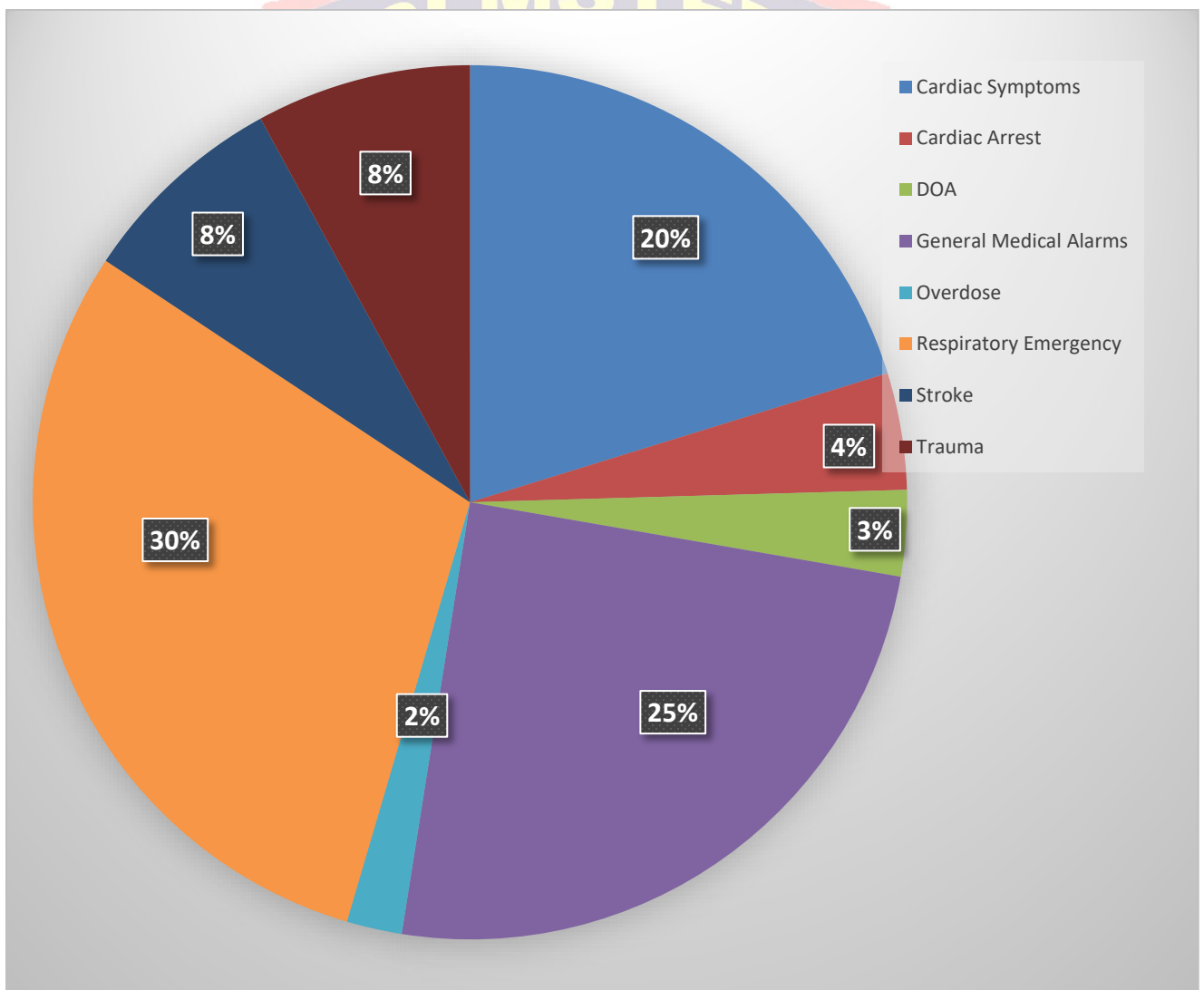



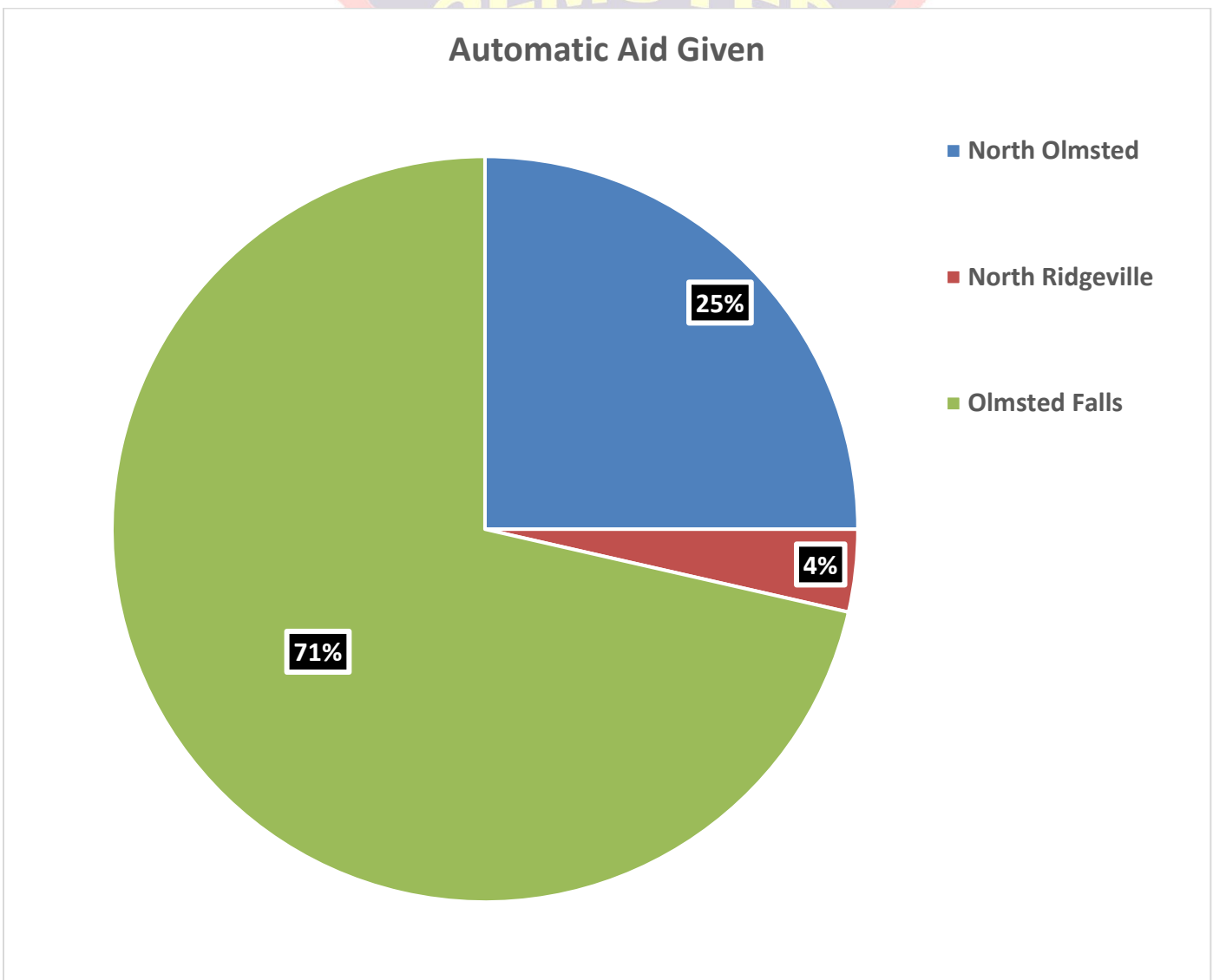
Automatic Aid Received - Fire

Automatic Aid Given - EMS Calls – Olmsted Falls - 1

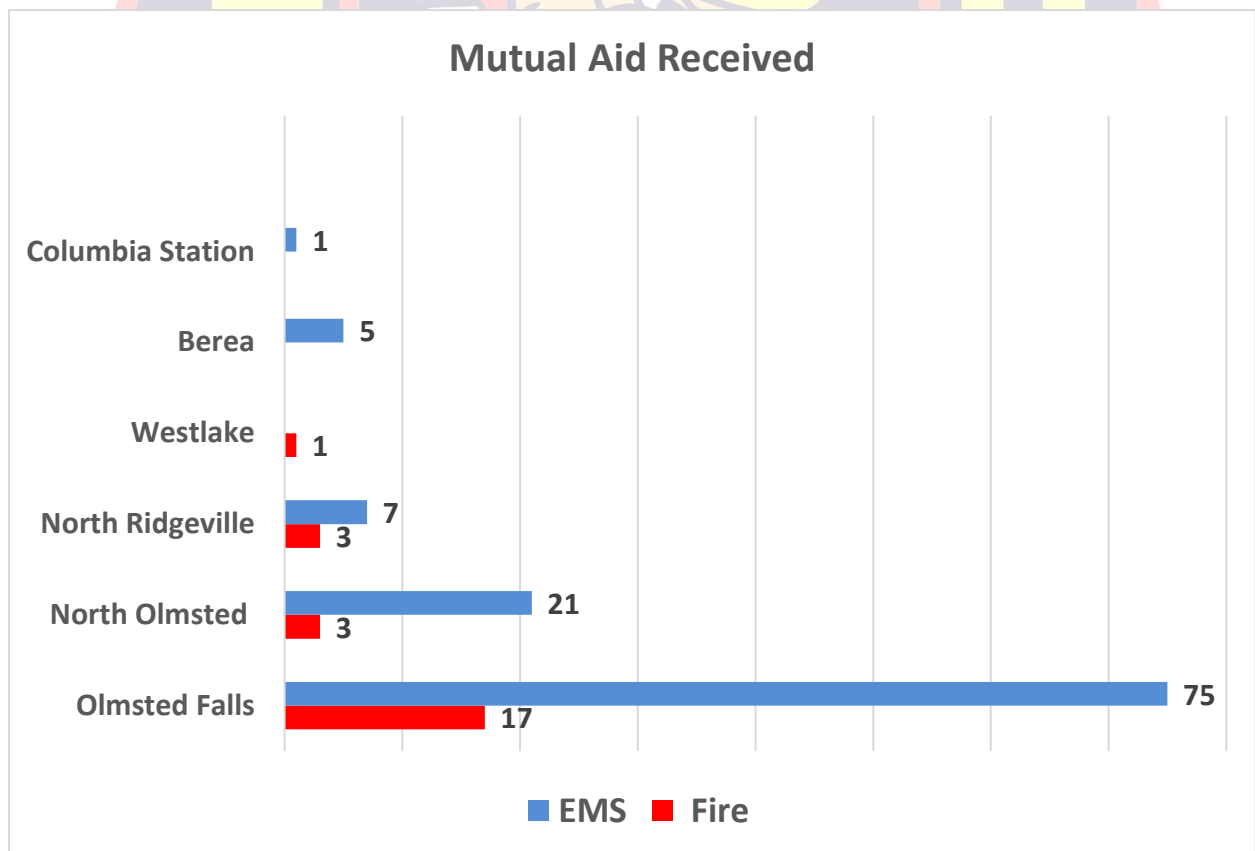

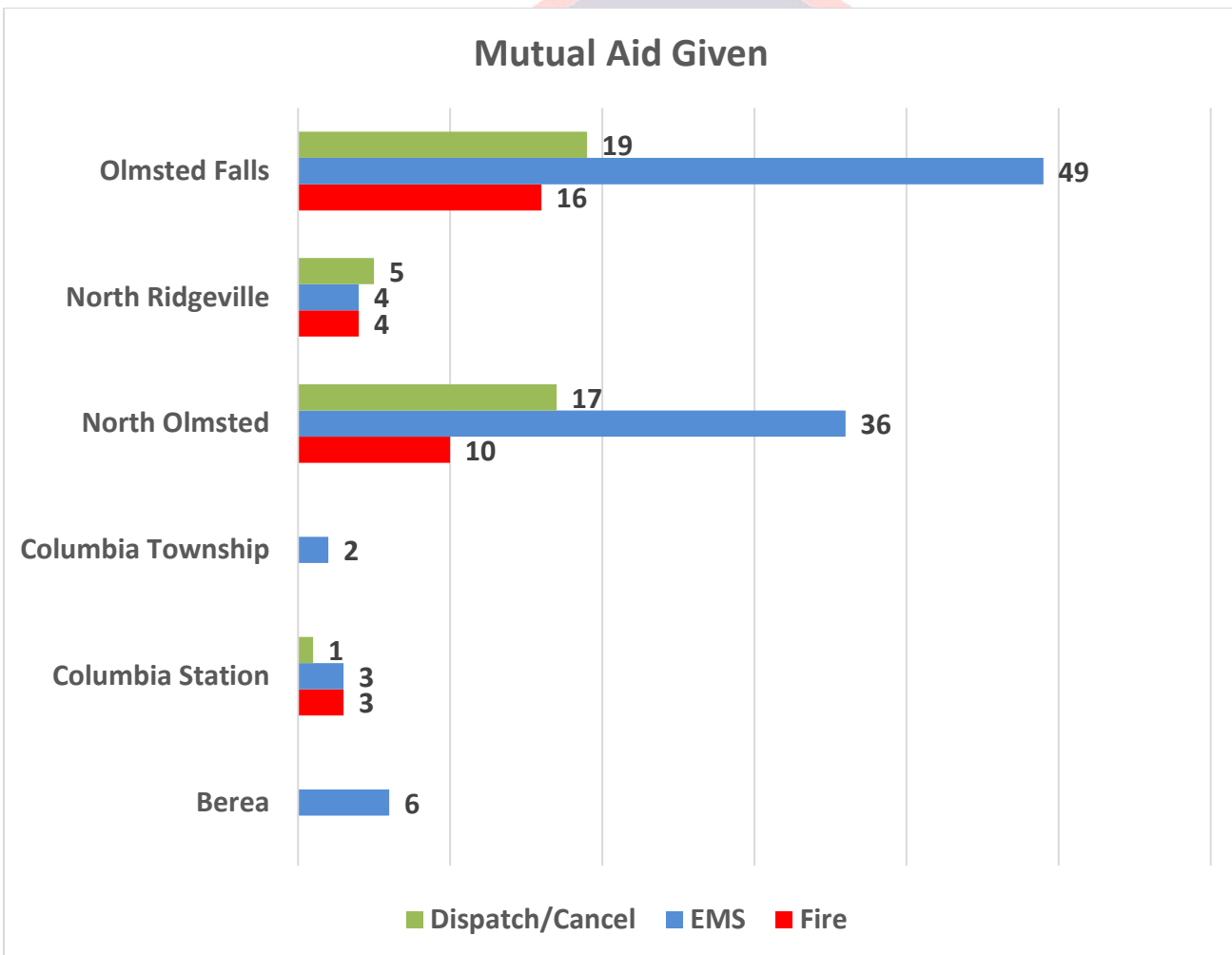

2021 Training Summary

In 2021, our firefighters and officers completed over 700 hours of fire and EMS training.

All firefighters, in the department, are required to complete 18 hours of continuing education every year. This training can be acquired in-house through one of our certified instructors, or at any other state accredited school or program.

The following topics were covered in 2021:

Fire Safety, Fire Safety Inspector, Search and Rescue, Aerial Ladder Training, Pump Operations, Strategies and Tactics, Fire Investigation, Vehicle Extrication, Ice Rescue Training, Water and Swift Water Rescue, Trench Rescue, as well as Officer Communications and Leadership and Decision-Making courses. EMS Medical and Miscellaneous coursework and Medical Continuing Education Units.

Completed hours of fire and EMS training: 754.5 documented hours



OTFD Programs

The OTFD has numerous programs available to our residents and businesses including the following:

- An annual life safety inspection program for all our schools & businesses
- A smoke alarm program (partnership with the American Red Cross)
- A File-of-Life Program to notify the responders of any serious health conditions
- A Knox-Box Program for our businesses
- A Residential Lock-Box Program for our residents
- A Community CPR/First Aid/Stop the Bleed Program – **free to Township residents!!**
- A reading program in our schools
- A Fire Prevention Home Fire Safety Coloring Contest for our schools

Our vision for the future includes expanding these vital activities to businesses, residents, and visitors in the Olmsted Community in addition to enhancing our readiness to respond to emergencies in this growing community.

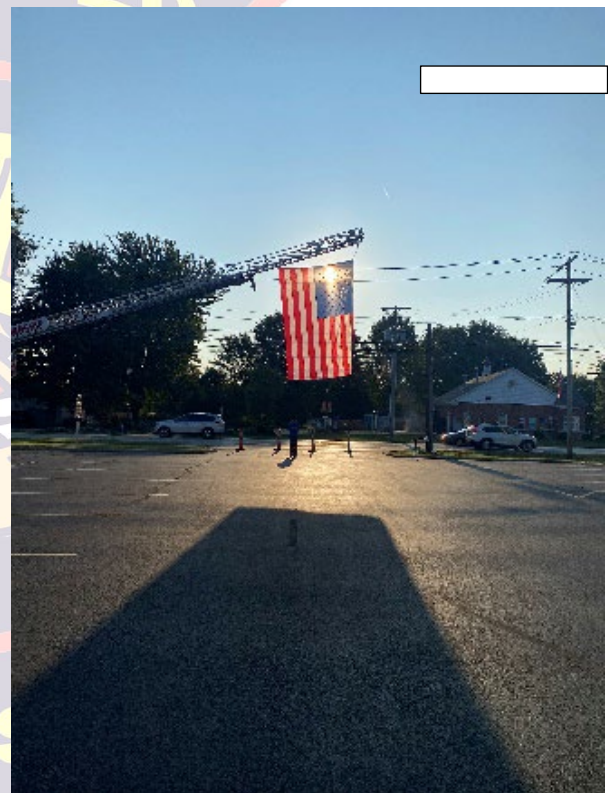

2021 Hydrant Flushing and Maintenance

From May until the end of June, department members flushed and serviced all the fire hydrants in the Township. This is important to ensure that the hydrants are not only operational, but this also flushes excess rust and corrosion from the interior surfaces of metal pipes. Approximately 950 hydrants now exist in the community. With the addition of some new residential developments and ongoing infrastructure, the number of fire hydrants will continue to increase. At the end of 2021 we only have a few areas in the Township without fire hydrant protection. Those areas are:

1. Jennings Road south of Bagley to the Irish American Club
2. Sprague Road west of Grand Oaks
3. Sprague Road between Usher Road and Woodgate Farms
4. Usher Road from Locust Drive south to Sprague Road
5. Fernhall and Thornbrook

To accommodate these non-hydrant areas, we have arranged service automatically to call for CLE Airport and Columbia Township Fire Department's Water Tanker to assist us for fires.

The Cleveland Water Department repairs and/or replaces our defective fire hydrants.



2021 Hose Testing

Every section of fire hose is service tested by the department every year. Below is a summary of those tests.

1 ¾" Hose- Used primarily for fire attack

1. 40 sections were tested and passed for a total of 2,100 feet.
2. 6 sections were removed due to failure.

2 ½" Hose- Used as fire attack and supply line

1. 40 sections were tested and passed for a total of 2,050 feet.
2. 2 sections were removed due to life failure.

5" Hose- Used as supply line

1. 22 sections were tested and passed for a total of 2,100 feet
2. 1 section was removed due to failure.

We have started a replacement program to replace the older fire hose from our inventory and ensure that our staff and your property gets the best and most reliable fire protection equipment available. In 2021, we replaced 8 sections of attack line (1 ¾ and 2 ½) and 1 section of supply line (5 inch). We also retired 8 sections of fire hose that was no longer serviceable due to age.



Capital Purchases

The following items were purchased in 2021 and are considered as capital inventory:

- New Ambulance – Medic #3 – scheduled to arrive in 2022.
- Radio Equipment for the new Medic Unit
- Life Pack Cardiac Monitor for the new Medic Unit
- New hose to replace aging equipment.
- Battery Powered Exhaust Fan for the new engine (arriving in 2022)
- Additional Body Armor for ballistic protection



Grants

The Olmsted Township Fire Department applies for many grants during the year. During the pandemic, the department received over \$100,000.00 in awards which were used to cover the cost of equipment and training that reduced or minimized those chances of contracting or spreading disease from patient to provider.



GRANT EQUIPMENT RECEIVED

State EMS grant \$1200 – purchased a King Vision intubation device.



FEMA AFG grant - \$16,500 purchased a fire extinguisher simulator package to train extinguisher use safely and environmentally conscientious.

- Continue to provide leadership training to our command staff
- New Medic Unit Delivery and finalize and equip new Rescue Engine
- Address peak times – add additional staff to peak call times
- Maintain the Engine, Ladder & Medic 2 as viable backup resources
- Resume Community Engagement Efforts post pandemic
 - Continued School Outreach
 - CPR, Smoke Alarms, Lock Boxes, File of Life, Car Seat Installs, etc.
 - Maintain the Life Fire Safety Prevention Program for our Businesses
- Continue our Standardized Fire, Rescue and Medical Training Programs
 - Include our Mutual Aid Partners
- Develop a Long-Range, Sustainable Strategic Plan for the Fire Department
