Bidding a Very Fond Farewell to Chief Vanyo

It is with mixed feelings that the Board of Trustees announces the retirement of Police Chief Matthew Vanyo after 27 years of service to Olmsted Township. Chief Vanyo entered the Department in May 1994 following Ohio Police Officer Training and was promoted to Sergeant in 2001.

In February 2009, Chief Vanyo was promoted to Lieutenant, second-in-command of an agency in a growing and changing Community that would, during this period, experience a 46% increase in population including the enforcement issues that accompany accelerated growth. He was promoted to Chief in May 2016.

Chief Vanyo instituted programs to strengthen the police-community partnership through the Community Engagement Initiative and was instrumental in support of our most at-risk population through his work with Christians in Action. In 2016, he co-created and initiated the Safe Passages Program with the Berea Police Department to assist opiate addicts seeking recovery options. For this, he received the City of Berea's "Spirit of Community" award.

Chief Vanyo was a member of the FBI National Academy Session #255 (April 2014-June 2014), is Lean Six Sigma certified and has served as an instructor throughout the area training young recruits on their path to a safety service career.

When Chief Vanyo was asked for some thoughts on his retirement, he said "I have tried to remember and act in line with Maya Angelou's often quoted remark, 'I've learned that people will forget what you said, people will forget what you did, but people will never forget how you made them feel'. I hope I have made those I have encountered over my tenure in Olmsted Township feel cared about, valued and respected".

He represented Olmsted Township and the agency throughout the region as a presenter at numerous law enforcement conferences and provided testimony to the United States Congressional Roundtable in Washington, DC regarding Ohio's opiate crisis in March 2017. Chief Vanyo's pride in Olmsted Township and the agency's Core Values... Courage, Integrity, Character, serve as a hallmark of his service and a point of reference for his "brothers and sisters in blue".

"During his tenure Chief Vanyo has provided a vision for the future and training to meet today's expectations. He has been instrumental in transforming the Township police department, now one of the most respected agencies in our region. On behalf of the Trustees, the men and women who have served with him throughout his career and the people of Olmsted Township he has served over the past 27 years, we wish him nothing but happiness and success in his future endeavors!," said Lisa Zver, Chair of the Board.

TOWNSHIP CURRENT PROJECTS

- We accepted a bid for \$124,000 to replace the roof on the Service facility; \$90,000 of that total will be covered by a NOPEC grant.
- We received bids for Summer 2021 road repair, rebuild, resurface for Grace and Greenbrooke Drives, a portion of Crestwood Lane, Yellowstone Drive and Regina Lane.
- The demolition of the abandoned wastewater treatment plant on Usher Road has been let for bid. A site visit for contractors is scheduled with a bid opening on April 16th.
- We will begin to prepare the Schady Road site for the dog park (till, level, and plant grass) and plan to set the fencing in May, weather permitting. Opening of the park is anticipated in late August.
- We received \$125,000 in State and County funding for construction of our two parks as well as a commitment from NEORS D for support. NOPEC, our energy aggregator provided a \$2,000 grant for our Step into Spring event.
- We completed projects funded through the CARES Act 2020.
- The Schady Soccer Field project has been graded and seeded; the OF high school project is scheduled for completion in May. Both projects addressed long standing stormwater issues in neighborhoods adjacent to school properties.
- We just received notification that the Township was awarded a County grant for \$139,245 for ADA sidewalk ramps in Woodgate Farms.
- We have applied for a \$200,000 grant for sidewalks on Fitch Road through NOACA/TLCI funding and are awaiting the determination.

TOWNSHIP TO CONSTRUCT TWO PARKS IN 2021

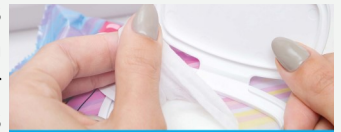

when disinfecting has become important. This has now become a nationwide problem per the EPA, NEORS D and others since, disposable wipes, even if the label reads “flushable” do not degrade or disintegrate. They can clog home plumbing and cause even more problems in public sewer systems. They should not be flushed down the toilet. Other items that should be disposed of in the trash or by other means: medication, hygiene products, chemicals/solvents, paper towels. For a complete list of items, please see our website.
